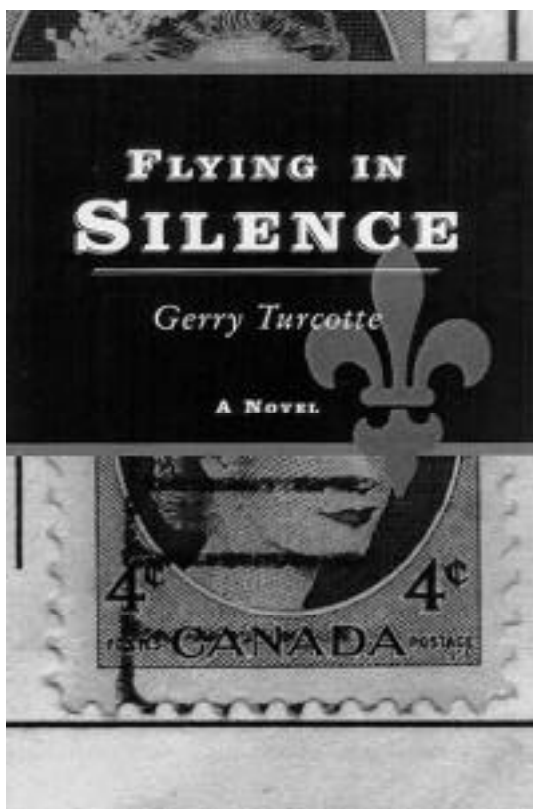

The Centre for Canadian–Australian Studies is pleased to announce the release of its first publication, the Nortel Networks Canadian Studies Inaugural Address delivered in July 2000 by Canadian Senator Vivienne Poy. The address offers a personal and historical discussion of the evolution of Canadian immigration law as well as the shifting trends and attitudes that have influenced the Chinese-Canadian experience.

The volume is published by the University of Wollongong Press and will be the first in a series of annual lectures delivered by prominent Canadians. Senator Poy's book will also feature an Introduction by Helen Sham-Ho, Member of the New South Wales Legislative Council. The publication is supported by a generous grant from Nortel Networks and will be available for sale in July 2001.

Terry Goldie is Professor of English at York University in Toronto. He is the author of *Fear and Temptation: the Image of the Indigene in Canadian, Australian and New Zealand Literatures* (McGill-Queen's, 1989) and *Pink Snow: Homotextual Possibilities in Canadian Fiction* (to be published by Broadview 2001). Canadian Studies Awards

The Canadian-Asia Pacific Award in Canadian Studies (CAPA) To assist scholars in higher education institutions or research and policy planning institutions in the Asia Pacific Region to undertake short-term research, including collaborative research, contributing to the understanding of bilateral and multilateral relations between Canada and the Asia Pacific. Up to two awards are made annually, each consisting of a grant ranging between C\$ 5,000 and C\$ 10,000 to assist with direct costs related to the research project and, when a research trip to Canada is warranted, providing assistance towards international airfare and a weekly flat rate allowance for a period not exceeding 5 weeks. (DEADLINE SEPT. 30)

Faculty Research Program (FRP) To assist individual academics in universities and research institutes to undertake short term research about Canada or aspects of Canada's bilateral relations with Australia and New Zealand, including interdisciplinary and comparative studies within the social sciences and the humanities. The maximum value of any one award is C\$ 5,900, consisting of the international airfare, domestic travel and living expenses for a minimum of 3 weeks and a maximum of 4 weeks. (DEADLINE SEPT. 30)

Faculty Research Program (FEP) To assist academics in higher education institutions to develop and teach courses about Canada, including comparative courses where not less than 50% of the teaching time is spent on the Canadian portion. The maximum value of any one award is C\$ 5,900 consisting of the international airfare, domestic travel and living expenses for a minimum of 3 weeks and a maximum of 4 weeks. (DEADLINE SEPT. 30)

Program for International Research Linkages (PIRL) Valued at up to C\$ 8,000 this program aims to promote and facilitate international collaborative research between research teams from Canada and one or more countries where Canadian Studies are represented. Specifically, the PIRL will fund research seminars or other forms of research linkages. (DEADLINE NOV. 15)

ICCS



Headquartered in Ottawa, the International Council for Canadian Studies (ICCS) is the umbrella organisation of twenty national and regional Canadian Studies Associations. The ICCS connects more than 7,000 professors, instructors and 'Canadianists' around the world and facilitates the organisation of conferences, the research and publication of articles, and the development of Canadian Studies courses.

The ICCS is a non-profit organisation which exists to encourage, promote and support Canadian Studies in all countries. Towards this end the ICCS maintains and administers a number of scholarships and grants for Canadian Studies including most of the Department of Foreign Affairs and International Trade's Canadian Studies Programs.
