



S. J. Butlin Prize

Economic History Society of Australia and New Zealand Prize for the Best Doctoral or Masters Thesis in Economic History

Aim

The aim of the prize is to reward outstanding postgraduate work in economic history. The prize honours the contribution of the late Professor Sydney Butlin to economic history.

Prize

The Butlin Prize is awarded triennially to the best Masters or PhD thesis in Australian or New Zealand economic history. It consists of A\$500 and publication of a digest or a chapter of the winning thesis in the *Australian Economic History Review*, subject to the normal editorial revision by the Review editors.

Procedure

Nominations should be submitted to the Secretary of the Society. It must include three copies of the thesis, which will be returned in due course. The executive committee of the Society will select independent readers, who will rank the theses and make a recommendation to the executive committee. The President will announce the winner and arrange presentation of the prize. The Society will only award the prize if a thesis of sufficient merit is received. The winner of the prize will be announced in the *Australian Economic History Review*.

Criteria

The prize shall be awarded to the candidate submitting the best thesis in the general field of Australian and/or New Zealand economic history, accepted by the examiners in the three years preceding the closing date, which met in full or in substantial part the requirements of a postgraduate research degree (Masters or PhD). A thesis may be submitted for the prize once only.
