Description: Studying at university involves preparing research, reading, writing, and getting assessments completed by due dates. This seminar suggests some ways to help organise yourself and your work.

Efficient reading strategies

Description: Studying for a degree involves a lot of reading. Learn how to identify essential information and to take useful notes. This seminar provides some useful tips on how to look for relevant articles, organise your reading and begin to develop your analytical skills.

Analysing the assignment question

Description: Having trouble understanding the assignment question? Don't know where to start in researching the assignment? This seminar helps you to unpack the requirements of an assignment question and develop a research and writing plan.

Essay writing

Description: The essay is one of the most common forms of assessment at University. This seminar looks at the fundamentals of essay writing, including analysing the question, conducting the research, and organising your ideas to

producing a well-argued and well referenced essay.

Developing a critical argument

Description: This seminar is for students with some experience of essay writing who would like to develop their skills further. We look at ways to use research to strengthen your argument and provide a focused and critical response to the essay question.

Report writing

Description: Reports are the second most used form of assignment. This seminar focuses on the writing style, logical development, and critical argument in the structure of the report.

Using evidence and referencing

Description: Which referencing style do you have to use? When should you use direct or indirect quotations? What is plagiarism? How can you avoid it? This seminar introduces you to the basic principles of using evidence and referencing in academic assignments to help you strengthen your arguments and avoid issues of plagiarism.

Description: Many subjects expect you to present your knowledge by talking in a class. This seminar discusses some ways of making the task easier, reduce your nerves, and get the best marks you can.

ASSIGNMENT WRITING CONSULTATIONS

Students requiring high level advice on disciplinary assignments can access a 40 minute one-on-one consultations with an academic language and learning lecturer on a limited basis. These are by appointment only.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE CONSULTATIONS

International students requiring assistance with the development of their English language proficiency can access a 40 minute one-on-one consultations with an English language specialist on a limited basis.

Planning your Research and Writing and Finding Theses

Tuesday 1 August 2.30 -4:30pm

Description: This seminar is run by Learning Development and the Library. It will overview important factors in thesis planning and help participants develop a realistic timeline for their research project. Participants will also develop a literature search and be shown how to navigate the myriad of databases and websites in Australia and overseas, which will allow them to identify and access other theses related to their area of research.
